Definitions

- ▶ Caring
 - Displaying kindness and concern for others.
- ▶ Safety
 - The condition of being protected from or unlikely to cause danger, risk, or injury.
- ▶ Leadership
 - The action of leading a group of people or an organization

The action of leading a group of people (or organization) to be protected, or lead them to be unlikely to cause danger, risk, or injury through kindness and concern .

Caring

- ▶ Know Thyself – Are you real?
 - Why do you care about safety?
 - I've seen enough.
 - What do you sincerely believe?
 - 0 injuries??? Cuts and Commitment.
 - What do you amplify?
 - Production or Safety?
 - Natural amplification of arrival.
 - ID fan alignment.
 - How do you spend your time
 - “Small” talk.
 - Why should anybody think you care about their safety if you don't care about their life? What about Injuries?
 - You win individuals one heart at a time?
 - Mill needs vs. individual needs

Caring and Consequences

- ▶ Consequences.....how does that match care?
 - Do you care enough to watch out for their safety?
- ▶ What is a good day for you?
 - Equipment will re-define.
 - Equipment has no feelings.
 - Equipment will not even slow down.
- ▶ Care enough to NOT let equipment teach consequences – it does not care.....
